Chair's Report

We enjoyed our Annual Parish Meeting on 18th April in the Village Hall. Thank you to so many of you for attending. We had great speakers, including Amanda Barnicoat from Chiltern Wildbelt and Malcolm Allison from Climate Action Weston Turville (CAWT), giving us illustrated presentations and engaging with parishioners. Amanda has been supporting us in increasing biodiversity in the village. Malcolm and all from CAWT work closely with the community and the parish council doing what we can to improve the situation in our current climate and ecological crises.

We also had our regular speakers. Hugh Chamberlin from Widow Turpin's Charity gave us a history of the charity and an update. If any of you know of anyone in need in the village needing a helping hand, in the form of a food voucher to use in the village shop, do get in touch with Hugh via the parish council. Cathy Terry gave us an update on the village hall and myself, Rachel, on the work of the parish council, hopefully encouraging more of you to join us! Full copies of the reports can be found on the parish council website. We were delighted to have new councillors Amanda Buchanan and Peter Routledge join us recently, bringing enthusiasm, experience and expertise in several areas.

We were very sorry to lose Martin Jarvis as a parish councillor this month as he moves from the area. Martin has done great work chairing our parish council for over 10 years, overseeing many of the projects that are enjoyed today, such as the new facilities on the recreation ground. I remember him visiting us in the Youth Café and engaging with the young people there about their wish for a skate park. They were consulted before and during the planning process until the skate park came into fruition. Huge gratitude to Martin for his great commitment to all that he has done for us over so many years. We wish him well as he moves to pastures new.

The Annual Parish Meeting is a great opportunity for us to meet with parishioners and hear your concerns. We heard from you about the lack of cycle paths in Weston Turville and will be looking into this great need to see what we can do to improve the situation. We also heard your concerns about road infrastructure - although this is under the jurisdiction of Bucks Council we do have influence.

Do keep your feedback coming in!

Café Update

We are delighted to report that the planning application for the conversion of the changing rooms to a café has been approved! This will be a great addition to the facilities at the recreation ground and hopefully well used by the community. The next

stage will be to tender for the work, this process started in May and we hope to have the café open sometime in Autumn. Watch this space...

Other Projects

The Parish Council is continuing to progress the provision of **outdoor gym equipment** and are in the final stages of the procurement process. The installation of the **table tennis table** has sadly been delayed due to the excessive wet conditions which prevented the grounds works, hopefully we will have some drier weather over the next few weeks.

The installation of batteries for the solar panels at the village hall and electric vehicle charge points in the car park are planned for this financial year.

Cllr Cook is setting up a working group of volunteers to help maintain our communal areas – see the advert on page 14.

Rights of Way – stiles and gates

The Parish Council is working with the ramblers association to replace some of the older stiles with gates in order to make the rights of way network more accessible to all. The first stiles were replaced earlier this year and are located in the fields between Wendover Road and Worlds End Lane. Many thanks to the Ramblers for their hard work.

All local residents are welcome to attend meetings of the council and its committees to observe and at the start of each meeting there is a chance for residents to raise any issues with the Council. On Thursday, 6th June, there will be an event to commemorate the 80th Anniversary of the D Day landings.

- News footage of the D Day landings and the Normandy Campaign which was the beginning of the end of World War II.
- Free light buffet will then be served, accompanied by music from the 40's.
- Colonel Pews, Chairman of the Buckinghamshire Military Archive, will be displaying interesting memorabilia from the Archive.

Planning Notices

Whether you have lived in the area for many years or have moved here more recently you may have spotted this common sight across the parish. These signs can be spotted on lampposts or attached to random walls and buildings sometimes very visible others less so. Mostly yellow in colour and look something like the image to the left.

If you do come across these notices nearby where you live or as you walk/drive about the parish, please do take notice of them. So why are they so important?

1. Public Awareness:

- Yellow notices play a critical role in informing the public about proposed developments.
- When someone submits a planning application, the local council must ensure that nearby residents and interested parties are aware of it.
- These notices serve as a vital link between the planning process and the community.

2. Subsequent Amendments:

- Yellow planning notices specifically denote subsequent changes or amendments to existing planning applications.
- If an applicant modifies their plans after the initial submission, the yellow notice informs the public about these alterations.
- This transparency ensures that affected parties can provide feedback or raise concerns.

3. Display Requirements:

- The local planning authority (LPA) is responsible for displaying yellow notices.
- The notice must be placed on or near the land to which the application relates.
- It should remain visible for at least 21 days.
- Adjoining property owners and residents can then review the proposed changes.

4. Legal Mandate:

- The use of yellow notices is legally mandated under Article 15 (1) of the Development Management Procedure Order (DMPO).
- They are part of the broader effort to ensure transparency and community engagement in the planning process.

You can view planning applications via Bucks Council's website or via the Parish Council website and click on Planning Tracker.

Whilst the Parish Council through its planning committee examines all planning applications and where necessary raises objections to address concerns, having the views and comments of our residents on applications, strengthens our ability to ensure any impacts of development are mitigated within the planning permissions. If not, your views will not be considered when Buckinghamshire Council is deciding on the application. Once planning has been granted there will be no other opportunity to voice your concerns.

You may have seen quite a few recently dotted around New Road and the village which is why we wanted to raise awareness of them. We often have residents' comment or come along to parish council meetings upset about not being aware of planning applications affecting them or the wider village. That's why these yellow notices are so important they are the only way you will know about any proposed development. They will all have an application ref number on them which you can search on the Bucks Council website. This will give you more detailed information of the proposed plans and allow you to make any comments directly to Buckinghamshire Council. Or alternatively come along to the monthly parish council meetings we meet the third Thursday of every month. So, if you do happen to spot one lurking on a lamppost or even hiding behind a hedge, please do stop and read it. They are vital in ensuring we uphold transparency in the development of our village and neighbourhoods over the coming years.

Weston Turville Village Hall is a registered charity, most of our income comes from hiring out the hall or from grants. The village hall committee is looking at ways to improve the space; the hall is being repainted during May half term and the committee would also like to submit a grant application to HS2 for funding to improve the facilities and equipment available at the village hall.

The hall is mainly hired for classes and private events but community events are also held there including the Easter and Christmas events. There is the opportunity to extend these to include for example, jumble sales, the repair cafe, performances such as panto, plays and concerts to make the hall the hub of the community again.

Community support is vital for the success of the funding application and we also need to demonstrate how the construction of HS2 has impacted you, your family and/or the parish. Please let us know your thoughts on the proposal or any suggestions for additional facilities that you or your group would find useful.

How has the construction works for HS2 affected you or your family? What facilities/equipment would you like to see at the hall? What would make it more desirable for you to hire? What groups/classes could you start up with equipment we buy? Would you be interested in a regular community group?

New bus service to Princes Risborough from 9th May!


Risborough Area Community Bus are extending their local bus service to the two garden centres situated on the A413 at World's End and Weston Turville.


The service will operate on Mondays and Thursdays, three times a day, and twice on Saturday mornings.

The bus is a green and white 16-seater mini bus and operates as a 'hail and ride' model, so anyone putting their hand out at any point on the route, the bus will stop for them. Bus pass holders travel for free and fare-payers will pay a flat one-way fare of £2.50 on a cash only basis.

Catching the bus to Princes Risborough will enable you to visit the many local facilities, such the highly regarded Leisure Centre and Swimming Pool, M & S and Tesco, plus many other shops and cafes all within a very short walk from the main bus stop outside the George and Dragon in Princes Risborough High Street.

You will also be able to enjoy the local countryside and walks around Princes Risborough and even catch the main line bus services to High Wycombe and the Chiltern Rail Service into London or continue on with RACB's bus services to Monks Risborough and Longwick.

OPEN WATER SWIMMING

With summer allegedly just around the corner, we can but hope for warmer weather. Longer days are guaranteed though and with this in mind, some folks might be thinking about getting a bit fitter, for the beach perhaps?

Well have you considered Open Water Swimming (OWS)? Wait! Come back! Don't go 'It's too cold for me' and turn the page, because there's a strong chance that if you've ever bashed out a few



lengths at Aqua Vale or Green Park or taken a dip in the sea at any British resort, then this could be the thing for you. For a start you can swim (so that's the 'S' bit ticked off). Now to address the 'OW' element.

It's a given that Open Water Swimming IS different to pool swimming. There is a definite sense of freedom to it – at its most basic level, it's a case of 'head down and go'. Okay, you have to sight the next buoy or landmark but there's no constraint of having to turn every 25 metres or swerve around kids chucking their locker key in and diving to retrieve it. At the risk of sounding esoteric and hippy-dippy, once you get into a rhythm with your stroke (generally front-crawl, though breaststroke is perfectly acceptable), it's just you, the water and mother nature.

.....and that's the next big selling point.

Whilst OWS can cover a dip in urban docklands, by and large, if and when you do take the plunge, you are going to be undertaking this exercise in areas of outstanding natural beauty, be it in a lake, a river or the sea. In doing so, you will definitely see our world, literally, from a different angle, plus there's every chance at some point you'll happen across a swan, duck, gull or grebe going about their business. Come on! That's got to be of interest hasn't it!?

Okay, let's address the elephant in the room (or the trout in the water) – 'Isn't it cold though'?

Long story short – it can be.

Some readers will have heard seen or read about Wim Hof and the Cold Therapy element to his 'happier, healthier stronger you' philosophy. Succinctly, Hof embraces the benefits of exposure to the cold and the benefits this confers - fat loss, reduced inflammation that facilitates a fortified immune system, balanced hormone levels, improved sleep quality, and the production of endorphins— the feel-good chemicals in the brain that naturally elevate your mood. All good stuff then, but probably only for the hardcore few. For the rest of us, we're probably better waiting until the water temperature at our chosen venue gets into the high teens centigrade, or definitely invest in a quality wetsuit. There's nothing wrong in being a fair-weather swimmer – your grin afterwards will be just as big.

Now your appetite has been whetted (wetted?), the temptation may be to head off to the reservoir, throw caution to the wind and leap in.

Please don't!

It's a sad, strange fact that Weston Turville is probably the furthest place from legitimate, organised and above all safe OWS spaces than anywhere in the country and yes, 'legitimate, organised and safe' are critical aspects for everyone to take on board prior to starting this activity. There are moves afoot to develop the quarry at Pitstone for OWS (see https://pitstone-quarry.co.uk/) but that's a few years away. For now, the dedicated Weston Turville-based OWS its:

- Bray Lake, Maidenhead (<u>https://www.braylakeswimming.com/</u>)
- Willen Lake, Milton Keynes (<u>https://www.willenlake.org.uk/activities/on-the-water/open-water-swimming</u>)
- Merchant Taylors School, Rickmansworth (<u>https://www.atwevents.co.uk/e/open-water-swimming-at-merchant-taylors-school-8890</u>)

Sessions times and costs vary, as do your pre-and post-swim facilities (showers and a hot drink are generally the order of the day) with personal preference for Queenford, which has a slick entry and exit system, excellent safety features with both land and water-based (canoe) marshals and is generally well attended for that all-important social



aspect.

As with all recreational activities, there will be an initial upfront cost for anyone contemplating dipping their toes, literally and metaphorically, into the OWS world, but please don't go down the 'all the gear – no idea' wormhole. Assuming you have a swimming costume, then a pair of buoyancy shorts or a wetsuit (there's a thriving second hand marketplace for such items), a buoyancy float and a fluorescent swim hat should be the only initial expenditure required.

......what's more critical is your 'get up and go' and sense of adventure!



Lamb Kebabs – perfect for a summer BBQ..

Ingredients

600g lean lamb 2 large red onions 200g cherry tomatoes ½ bunch of fresh mint 300g fat-free natural yoghurt 1 lemon For the marinade... 3 cloves of garlic 2 big pinches of fennel seeds (crushed) 1 lemon Olive oil



Method

- 1. Soak the wooden skewers in warm water for at least 20 minutes before using.
- 2. Make the marinade by crushing the garlic cloves and mixing with the crushed fennel seeds and some sea salt and black pepper. Mix in the lemon zest and about 80ml of olive oil.
- 3. Cut the lamb into 5cm pieces, peel and slice each onion into wedges, then place in a large tray. Add the cherry tomatoes and mix in the marinade.
- 4. Thread, alternating ingredients, onto the skewers, then refrigerate until ready to cook.
- 5. Finely chop the mint leaves and mix with the yoghurt, a pinch of salt and pepper, a squeeze of lemon juice and a dash of extra virgin olive oil.
- 6. Preheat the barbecue, grill or griddle pan. Grill the kebabs, turning occasionally, for about 7 minutes, or until cooked through.
- 7. Serve with a squeeze of lemon juice and the minty yoghurt.

Minty Mojitos

Ingredients

- 1/2 cup mint leaves
- ½ cup water
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1 cup lime juice
- 2 cups white rum (optional)
- 2 cups soda water

Lime and mint leaves to garnish



- Add sugar water and mint to a saucepan,
- simmer until the sugar has dissolved.
- Turn off heat and leave to stand for 5 minutes, then strain into a pitcher.
- Add the lime juice and rum to the pitcher.
- Add the extra mint leaves and lime cut into rounds.
- Add some ice and stir in the soda water
